A message from John C. Pennoyer, District Superintendent

We were very pleased that all thirteen of our component school boards approved our administrative budget this year. With Linda



Poleski's leadership, the entire administrative team, supported by the Business Office staff, worked hard for virtually the entire year to produce as many cost reductions as possible. Budget lines and equipment were reduced by 65% compared to the previous year; by 4% in the supply lines; and by 10% in contractual expenses. As always, however, we are burdened by the same fixed costs that affect us every year--increases in TRS and ERS, increases in medical insurance and retiree health insurance, and the new MTA payroll tax hit us for another \$77,000. When all of the cost reductions and zero-growth lines were factored in with the "high ticket" fixed costs, the overall administrative budget increase was 4.7%.

So the good news is that we were supported unanimously by our component districts. The bad news is that service requests for 2010-11 are significantly lower than in previous years. The impact has been that we have had to lay off almost eighteen full-time equivalent staff. Hopefully, service requests will increase early next fall and we will be able to recall some of those staff members.

The Governor has proposed a reduction in state aid to school districts by over 5% for 2010-11. And the overall picture for the out years is also not encouraging.

We will all have to be vigilant regarding expenditures for the foreseeable future.

The competition was held in the OnCenter in Syracuse, on April 14 and 15. The scope of the contests includes an intense practical hands-on component as well as a written knowledge test.

Megan Kalkowski will also be joining her to compete in the Job Demo national contest. These students will be asked to compete against the best in the country.

NYC, NY – Attending a prestigious gala in New York City does not happen very often—especially for high school students. Several Dutchess BOCES Career and Technical Institute (CTI) Culinary Arts Program students and Chef Instructor Darcy Sala were invited by The Culinary Institute of America (CIA) to attend this year's annual CIA Leadership Awards. The gala took place on March 18 at Cipriani 42nd Street in New York City. 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Earth Day Car and Recycling Projects with Elementary Students

On April 24 and 25, Dutchess BOCES participated in the 40th Anniversary Hudson Valley Earth Day Celebration at the Dutchess County Fairgrounds. It was the first time Earth Day was celebrated at the fairgrounds. Dutchess BOCES was represented in three areas; early childhood education, automotive repair, and construction.

Students in the Early Childhood Program taught kindergartners and younger children about the recycling process. They provided a hands-on activity that included sorting paper, plastic and metal then tossing items into appropriate bins.

Students from the Automotive Program built a green car powered by photo voltaic solar energy. The car achieves 45 miles to a charge and travels at a speed of 25 miles per hour. It is still a work in progress.

A Closer Look at the e-Learning COSER

The BOCES e-Learning service provides professional development and support for digital technology that facilitates learning by enhancing classroom instruction. The practice of e-Learning in today's school environment is a viable and practical way to engage students.

Online education provided through tools such as MOODLE can facilitate the mastery of essential 21st century skills. Members of the e-Learning service will have full access to MOODLE, Ensemble Video, video conferencing, and virtual field trips. The Construction Cluster built a modelscale (approximately 12' x 12') renewable energy home that uses current technology. The purpose is to demonstrate efficient methods in electrical and building construction. Spray foam insulation was used to achieve zero heat loss through electrical outlets; LED lighting was installed along with an occupancy sensor that automatically turns off lights to save energy; a 98% efficient wall-hung boiler was installed for domestic water and radiant heating, and low-e glass windows were installed, as well. The E stands for emissivity. Low-e glass works by reflecting heat back to its source. The proposed solar panels were not added due to time limitations.

The model house was approximately 70% complete at the time of the fair and is still under construction.


We have more disease today than ever before. If our health care system truly works, then why are we so sick?

Our concept of what distinguishes health is wide and varied. Some people say they are healthy if they feel good. Many people base good health on a lack or presence of symptoms. According to Dorland's Medical Dictionary, health is defined as "physical, mental, and social well being, not merely the absence of disease or infirmity."

Basing the condition of the body on symptoms can be dangerous. Sometimes one can have very poor health with no symptoms. For example, the first sign of a heart attack often is the heart attack itself. Occasionally symptoms can be extreme. As I look back on nine vears of service on the BOCES Board of Trustees, it is with a


